Letter from the Vicar

A couple of year’s ago, I became part of a conspiracy. Part of my radical Berkeley past? Not really. Although I was living in Berkeley at the time, and it is radical in the sense that it opened me up more fully to the radical love of Christ. The conspiracy I’m referring to is The Advent Conspiracy.

In 2006 a group of pastors became aware of how difficult it was to proclaim the Good News of the Christmas story—with all the promise, hope, and revolutionary love of God being with us—when they and all of their parishioners were frantically rushing around in what has become a season of stress, shopping lists, traffic jams, mountains of consumer debt, and tons of waste. It’s estimated that Americans spend \$450 BILLION on Christmas every year.

What happened to turn a celebration of the Incarnation—of God being with us—into something we just hope we can survive? Asking “Is this what we really want out of Christmas?”, these pastors be-

gan to seek ways to re-imagine and reclaim the radical and transforming message of God so loving the world that God became human. What they hit upon were a variety of ways to “Worship Fully, Spend Less, Give More, Love All.”

For the last couple of years, Monica and I have been following their lead and conspiratorially trying to live into the real promise of Advent and Christmas by giving more relational gifts—gifts of time and gifts of self—that draw us more deeply into relationships with our family and friends, and also stretch us into relationships with those outside our family system.

For instance, we looked for gifts that would encourage and build relationships and time together—family games, museum & zoo memberships, toys and books that our whole family could enjoy. We also began to discuss with our extended families ways of sharing our abundance with others. One year the adults in our family got together and decided to donate the

money we would have spent on gifts for each other to The Heifer Project (<http://www.heifer.org/>).

The next year Monica & I bought all the adults in our families shares in the micro-lending venture Kiva (<http://www.kiva.org/>), which allowed them to make loans to people in developing countries to start businesses. We have also exchanged “gifts” of malaria nets through Episcopal Relief and Development (<http://www.er-d.org/>). If you are also conspiratorially minded, and are looking for ways to transform your Christmas into something more life-giving and relational—more Christ-like—I invite you to go to the Advent Conspiracy’s website (<http://www.adventconspiracy.org/>) and look around. Perhaps you’ll want to join the conspiracy and this year, and, as my fellow conspirators like to say, “give fewer presents, but give more Presence”.

Count each light you use to decorate this Christmas. Give 10 cents to charity for each.

Think about the gifts you plan to give this Christmas. Would you feel uncomfortable if Jesus were present during your gift sharing?

Prayers of the People

You've probably noticed that we've changed the way we do the Prayers of the People during our Sunday liturgy, and you may have wondered why. It is a commonly overlooked rubric in the Prayer Book, but the instructions on page 383 say "Any of the forms which follow may be used. Adaptations or insertions suitable to the occasion may be made."

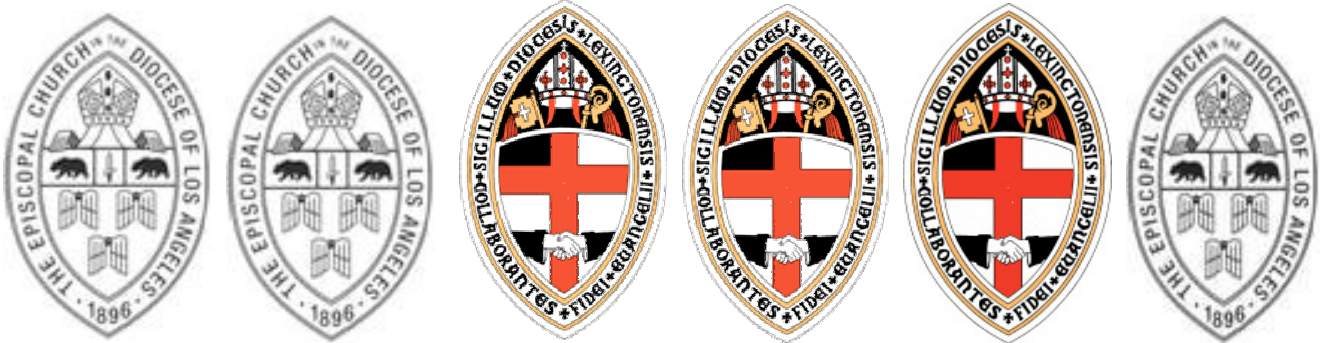
In other words, the forms are suggestions to help get people started writing the prayers, not something

that should be followed exactly. In the Supplementary Liturgical Materials (Enriching Our Worship) this point is made quite clearly. "Of the six forms provided, none are required. Any of them may be used or adapted to the occasion. They may also be replaced by other forms. All that is required is that the topics listed at the top of page 383 be included."

For the past several months we have been living into this expanded understanding by adapting the

Prayers of the People to more closely reflect the realities of our communal life together. I hope that this continues to be something that will enrich and deepen our spiritual lives. If you are interested in learning more about how to write the Prayers of the People, and feel that this is a ministry you might want to grow into in the coming year, please speak to Richard.

There will be a bidder's conference held Tuesday, December 8, 2009 at Our Savior Episcopal Church, 2323 Lexington Road, Richmond, KY. Contractors are required to attend this meeting in order to be eligible to submit a bid. Contractors will be given the opportunity to inspect existing building interior/exterior, review proposed renovations and organize/propose implementation plans for the renovations to the building.

Proposals will be accepted in our office, located at 710 West High Street, Lexington, KY 40508. Bids must be received or postmarked on or before December 22, 2009.

Status of the Building Fund

As of the end of October, 2009, the balance in the Church of Our Saviour's Building Fund is \$29,999.23. Of that, \$17,423.78 is in our Hilliard Lyons Building Fund Account (money market, 100% cash equivalent); \$12,175.45 is invested in a Dodge & Cox endowment fund; and \$400 is in our checking account waiting to be transferred to

Hilliard Lyons.

Designated donations to the building fund so far this year are \$3,861. We currently owe \$184,691.61 in principal on our loan to the Diocese of Lexington. Under our agreement with the Diocese, we are paying only interest on that loan through 2011 at the rate of 2.5%

(\$4,627.24 per year.) As of the end of October, we have paid \$3,847.74 in interest to the Diocese and owe \$769.54 for the remainder of the year.

With the annual meeting for the Church of Our Saviour coming up on Sunday, January 10, 2010, let me call on each of you to prayerfully consider your commitment to serve Christ in our church and our community during 2010. During our stewardship campaign, I know that many of you gave much thought to your gifts of time, talent and treasure.

If your prayers and your consideration have led you to a decision to become more involved in the life and work of Our Saviour, this is the perfect time to take the next step. At the annual meeting we will be electing three new members to serve on the Bishop's Committee. We will also be electing two delegates and two alternates to the Diocesan Convention.

Just make a call or send an e-mail to a member of the nominating committee if you would like your name placed on this most important ballot. Listed at the end of this message is the contact information for each member of the nominating committee. We look forward to hearing from YOU.

Another important way to serve is a one-year appointment as a committee chair for the Outreach, Evangelism, Parish Life or Worship committees. Church leadership is far more than serving on the Bishop's Committee. Committee chairs are also a part of the core leadership of this congregation. Remember that we have new guidelines in place for service on committees and for committee chairs, so be assured that this is no longer a lifetime commitment. Please let Richard or any member of the Bishop's Committee know that you are interested in any of these leadership opportunities.

Finally, the time has come for Our Saviour to come into compliance with insurance requirements of the national church regarding keys to our buildings. We are currently reviewing the most recent policies regarding who can be assigned a building key and what training or commitments are required of those who hold a key.

Sometime in the near future, we will be changing the locks and assigning keys according to church insurance guidelines. This should not be a hardship on anyone. If you need a key to the church, you will have one. Our goal is simply to be good stewards of all of our assets (buildings, furnishings, and grounds) and to be a safe and welcoming place for all who may come through our doors. Coming into compliance with both our insurance policy and the new diocesan policies will ensure that this is possible.

Check out our new Web Site!

The Episcopal Church of Our Saviour has a new web site: oursaviourky.org. The new site provides up-to-date information about the church and its activities, and is a vehicle for the church, congregation and visitors to communicate. The site is being designed with the goal of providing dynamic content in an attractive style with easy-to-use navigation.

Upcoming events and general information are prominently displayed on the front page and updated regularly. In addition to content from the old site such as outreach, church programs, server schedules and past newsletters, new sections have been added such as audio recordings of past sermons, a calendar of events, a map with directions, and a photo album.

Navigation is supported by a consistent layout and presenta-

tion, a side bar menu, a search function, and links on each page showing the path to the current page ("breadcrumbs"). Contact information appears at the foot of each page, and there is also a "Contact Us" page that will eventually contain email addresses for various points of contact in the Church.

The site is being maintained using a content management system that allows the site administrators to log in and update the site from any computer. This will ensure that our web site stays current and up to date.

Dec. 6 – In preparation for the community performance of part one of Handel’s *Messiah* on Dec. 8 and the Lexington Singers performance on Dec. 11, Sandra Plant will present an overview of this segment that tells of the prophesy and realization of God’s plan to redeem mankind by the coming of the Messiah.
